## **GLOSSARY**

Term	<b>Definition</b>
Community	A group of residents who share a neighborhood and a common set of circumstances. Communities are multidimensional and complex. Understanding the complexities of local communities helps with strategizing to meet various needs.
Community Power	Community members are able to mobilize and shape outcomes at the community level where they can address local concerns.
Place	A geographical local region with distinct heritage, cultures, landscapes, opportunities and experiences.
Power	The ability to exercise control, to direct resources, to bring about outcomes, to influence others, and even to change the rules.
Racial Equity	A focus on the racially inequitable redistribution of benefits within existing systems and the prevention or reduction of harm.
Racial Justice	A focus on fundamentally addressing and transforming the systems that generate racialized suffering due to systemic racism.
Resources	Source of supply, support in financial or other forms that can be readily drawn upon when needed.
Community Change	Transformation in residents' ability to sustain and scale long-term systemic impact in the community.
Community Values	Non-negotiable core principles or standards that the community's residents wish to maintain.
